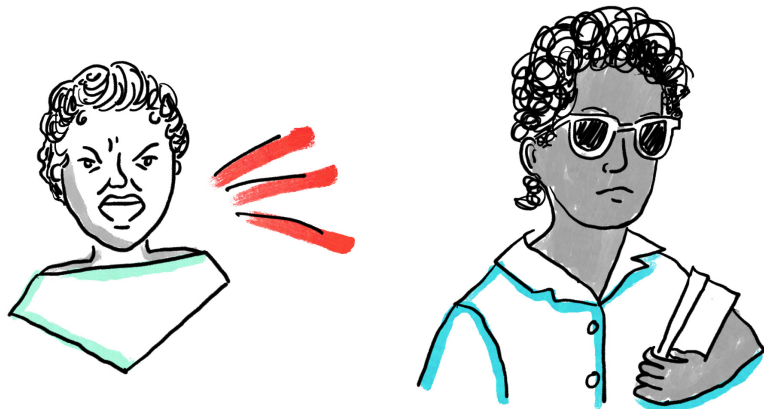

The next day, she tried again and her friends were there with her. It wasn't easy, people still said mean things. But Elizabeth didn't give up. She finished the school year.

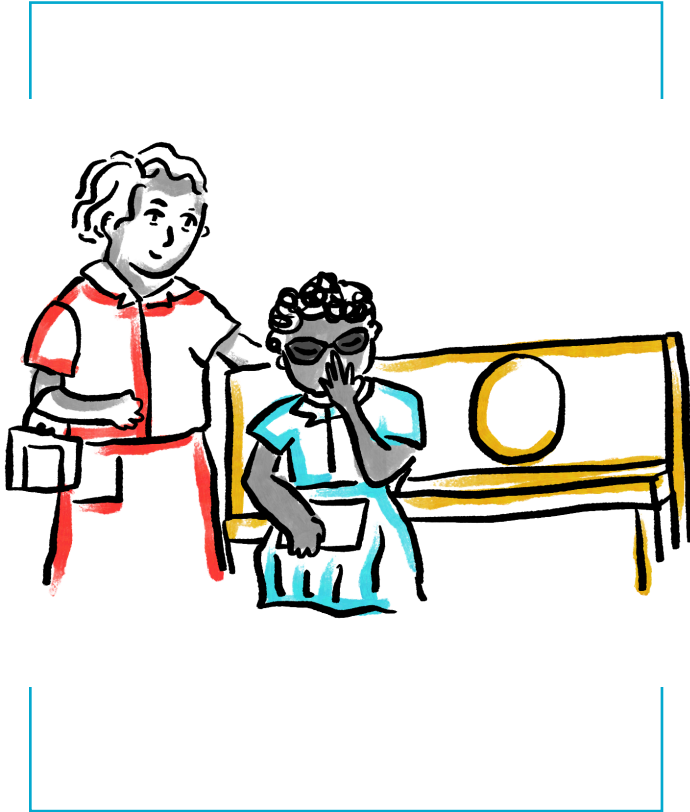

named Elizabeth Eckford in 1957.



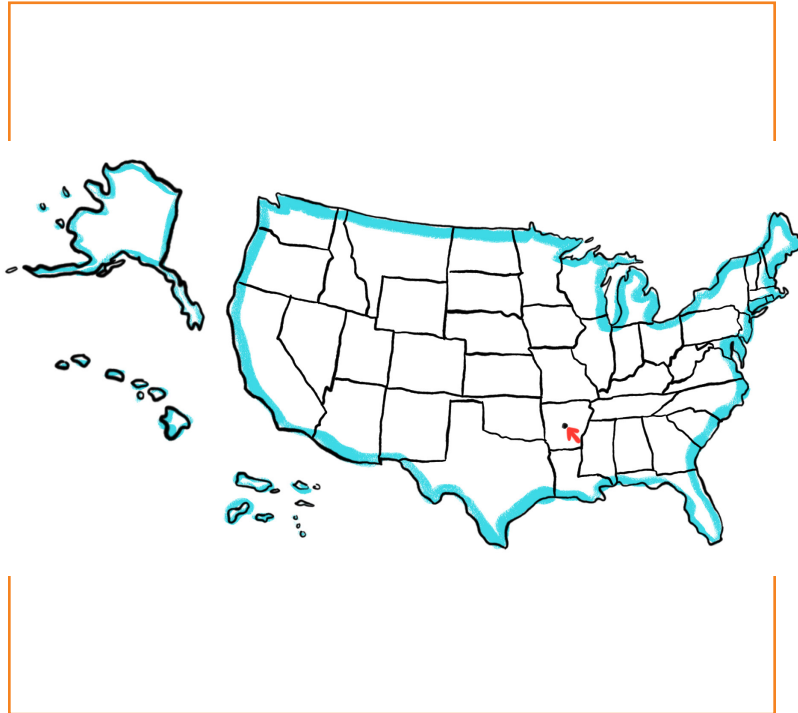
Sounds

Elizabeth was scared, but she kept walking tall. She didn't cry. She didn't run. She was brave. She had courage.

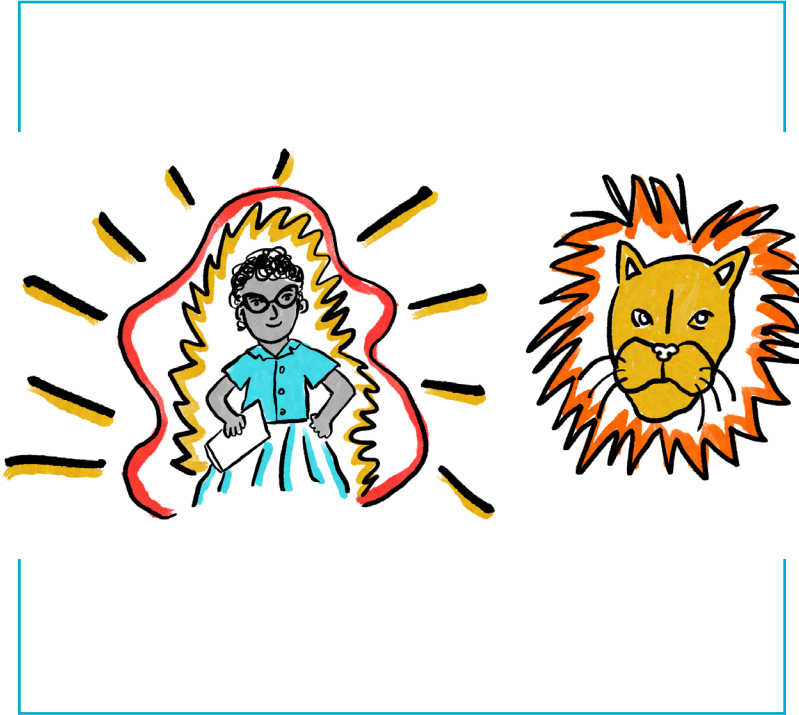

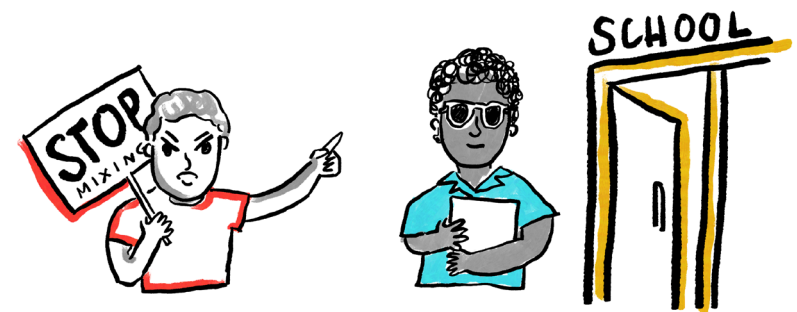
How did Elizabeth Eckford show courage?

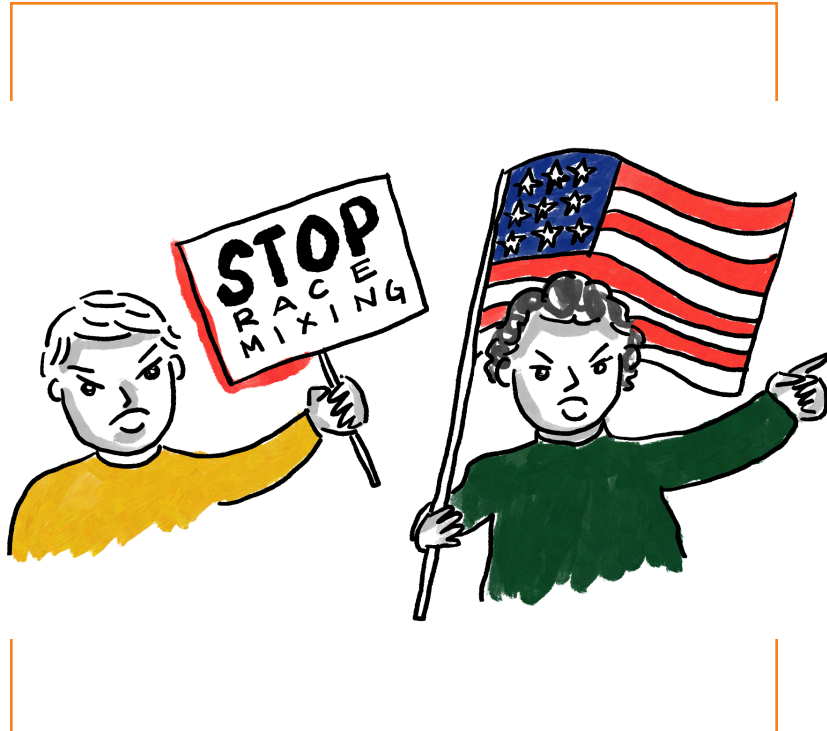
Elizabeth was supposed to meet up with the Little Rock Nine at school, but they didn't show up. Something had gone wrong.
